## Researcher's Notes:

Elizabeth "Libbie" Nienke wrote the Temecula Gossip Column from May 20, 1921 through January 27, 1922. Miss Nienke's writings reflected her generational viewpoint. She often would write about her peers and the activities they were involved in. Miss Nienke's enthusiasm for the Temecula Indians during the Riverside County Baseball League 1921 season was infectious. Mrs. Sands reported that in February 1922 Elizabeth Nienke went to Riverside to attend Junior College.

Mrs. V.B. Sands' name first appeared in the gossip column on September 10, 1920 and continued until April 1, 1921. A month later, Elizabeth Nienke began writing the column. After Nienke left for junior college, Mrs. Sands resumed writing the column on February 10, 1922. Mrs. Sands' writing tended to focus on her peer group and on occasion she would write about the younger generation. Her close circles of friends' activities are reported on almost weekly.

Temecula, December 6 – The passing away of R. J. Welty, one of our beloved citizens, at 12 o'clock last Wednesday morning was a shock to his family and friends, as the same indomitable spirit which had carried him through so many trials and hardships during the past half a century or more, exerted itself to the (?)st, and kept him practical upon his feet

to the last, as he had been confined to his bed only three days when our Supreme Ruler called the spirit which he had given nearly (?)7 years before.

The deceased at the time of his demise was 86 years and 8 months of age. He was born in Warren County, Illinois, April, 1836. He moved to Iowa in 1856, where he married, and six years later felt the call of the Idaho gold rush, going to that state but only remained a short time when he decided to move to California.

Taking his wife and two daughters, Nancy and Tilley he started out on his long journey over the mountains and after nearly a year of hardships, fighting Indians and snowstorms, reached San Bernardino suffering from a wound received during a clash with the Indians a short distance from that place. In 1869 he settled in Rainbow, a few miles from Temecula, and was the second settler in that vicinity. The spring of 1885 he moved to Temecula, going into business and later built the only hotel in which he resided until his death.

He is survived by his widow, seven daughters, Mrs. McConville, of Los Angeles, Mrs. Bemis and Mrs. Birge, of San Bernardino, Mrs. Kinkead and Mrs. Helwig of Escondido and the Misses Hattie and Tillie Welty of Temecula: eleven grandchildren, five great-grandchildren, a sister, Mrs. Martha Wood, of Washington, and a brother, Joe Welty, of Temecula.

Funeral services were held at the hotel Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. Bermora, of Murrieta. Mrs. Alta Wickerd and Mrs. Van Hale sang "Nearer My God to Thee," which was rendered in such a manner that it seemed to draw the departed spirit nearer to the family and friends present, only to be awakened to the realization that the man of determination in this world had answered that call from which no one return.

The numerous floral pieces sent, and the great number of friends who attended the last sad rites was a living testimony of the love and esteem in which the departed had been held. Interment was made in the Temecula Cemetery.

Temecula, December 27 – The happy holiday spirit of the whole community was turned abruptly to sadness by the sudden death of Jacques Escallier, one of our beloved citizens, who passed away at his home from a stroke of paralysis a few minutes past 9 o'clock Saturday morning December 23, at the age of 61 years, 4 months and 28 days.

The deceased was born in Aux Marrats Hautes Alps, France, July 25, 1861. While still a young man he decided to come to this country and take his chances along with his brother, Hypolite, who had been located several years at Winchester, Calif. So in March, 1881, after enduring hardships which were only realized by those who pioneered in this country, he reached his brother and commenced a new life so different to which he had been accustomed in France that it was a hard, up-hill pull but perseverance, honesty and kindness toward all enriched him in the hearts and thoughts of all who came in contact with him. He only remained in the vicinity of Winchester a few years, coming to Temecula in 1886, where he went into business and in 1887, was married, living here until he was taken from this material world to receive his just reward in heaven for the many loving, just and charitable deeds he did while with us here.

He is survived by his widow and nine children, seven sons and two daughters; Alexander, Peter, Miss Bessie, Richard, Albert and Edward of Temecula, Mrs. Fred Winkels of Spokane, Wash., Charles Escallier of Los Angeles and Arthur Escallier, who has been attending college at Corvallis, Oregon; two brothers, Hypolite Escallier of Temecula and Peter Escallier of Los Angeles and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Rambaud of Los Angeles and the Misses Octova and Agatha Escallier of Temecula, all of whom were here during the last illness of their loved one excepting Mrs. Winkels, who was ill and unable to be present.

Funeral services were conducted from the Catholic Church here. Rev. Father Raly of Elsinore officiating.
